Second Narrator: Paul Revere had quite a few successful missions but he also had quite a few missions that ended poorly. For example, once the English found him in a rowboat snooping around Castle Island in the Boston Harbor. They stopped him, questioned him, and locked him up for two day and three nights.

First Narrator: But of all Paul missions and rides, nothing was bigger than the ride he was destined to do on Saturday, April 15<sup>th</sup>.

Paul: (He's working as a silversmith in his shop making teapots) The British Parliament just won't listen to us, Rachel.

Rachel: I know. We keep getting all these new laws and taxes sent our way and we have nobody to represent how we feel. It's just not fair!

Paul: I heard that more British soldiers might be coming down the Charles River tonight.

Rachel: (looking worried) Paul, did you volunteer to check? I hate it when you do this! You're always putting yourself in danger! Why can't it be Sam or John that goes instead? Why must it always be you! (Rachel begins to cry)

Paul: I'm sorry, Rachel. I hate to worry you but I really feel I'm the best person for the job.

Act 2

British Soldier 1: Hey, did you hear the news?

British Soldier 2: No, what's going on?

First Narrator: As the two soldiers walk away, they don't notice the stable boy working with the horses.

First Narrator: The stable boy reports what he hear to Dr. Joseph Warren, he was the director of all Patriot activities out of Boston. Dr. Warren sends for Paul.

Dr. Warren: Paul, I need you to alarm all the citizens so that they can arm themselves.

Paul: What? Do you actually believe that the fighting is going to begin tonight!?

Dr. Warren: I'm afraid that war is the only logical choice at this point. There's no turning back.

Paul: Is there anyone else I need to share this information with?

## Act 5

## Act 6

English Solider 3: What? You mean Paul Revere?

Paul: Yes

Second Narrator: The soldiers started cheering because they knew that Paul was a Patriot. As they rode off with their new prisoners, they heard a volley of gunfire.

English Solider 6: Get down!

English Solider 7: Is that the colonists firing at us? What do we do?

English Solider 3: Wait. I'm sure it's just another British patrol.

Paul: Nope. That's the signal to alarm the countryside that fighting is about to begin.

First Narrator: When the soldiers heard that, they decided to get back to their own squad instead of messing around with their prisoner, Paul. After they took away his horse, the British patrol was on their way.

### Act 8

First Narrator: He made it just in time. John and Samuel Adams were just about to leave in John Hancock's carriage when Paul walked up.

John Hancock: Paul! What are you doing here?

Sam: Where's your horse? Did something happen?

Paul: Yes, a British patrol captured me but they released me when they heard a volley of gunfire.

Sam: You were lucky.

Paul: Yes, but I need a horse. Is there another one available?

John: Let's head to the tavern and see if someone can help.

Second Narrator: While the three Patriots headed to the tavern, little did they realize that farmers were gathering all over the Lexington Green. Over 50 men were prepared to take a stand against the oncoming British army. John Parker, the leader of the minutemen, shouted, "Don't Fire unless fired upon, but if they mean to have war, let it begin here!"

First Narrator: From inside the tavern, the three Patriots were alarmed when they heard gunshots.

Second Narrator: No one knows which side fired first, but the shots rang out.

First Narrator: Eight minutemen were killed and several others were wounded. As the British troops returned to Boston, the

Minutemen fired at them from nearby woods and fields, killing 73 soldiers in the process.

Second Narrator: Thus, the beginning of the American Revolution.
